Police & Domestic Violence




- Police play a vital role in the response to DV
- First contact for many families
- Obligations to act (i.e., to intervene and protect victims and families)
- Gate keepers to the Justice System / potential services
- Little research examining police response to children exposed to DV
 - Children are viewed on: "the side-line"


What is actually taking place for police?

The vast majority of police officers are saying they frequently engage with children

The majority of police surveyed also indicated that they used a structured risk assessment tool

Final Highlights



 Police are talking about: inconsistency, need for training, and the importance of collaboration

 The police can do a better job but cannot succeed on their own!

Violence Against Women (VAW) Services

VAW Services



 Shelters offer protection for women and children who are fleeing from domestic violence

• In Ontario, there are 100 organizations that provide some form of domestic violence services (Ontario Ministry of Community Services, 2019).

In Canada, 3, 137 children accompanied 3, 565 women to shelters

Research Question



What are the barriers to providing child-specific services within VAW agencies?

Current Research Study



• An analysis of interviews with 27 Ontario VAW service providers (81% DV shelter workers)

Examination of key barriers to service provision for children





Systemic Barriers

Challenges with interagency collaboration

Lack of services within community

Overall, VAW workers are dedicated to helping their clients, however they are limited by barriers within and outside of their agency

Child Protection Services

Role of Child Protection Services



- Assessing risk to children, safety planning, risk management
 - DV and child maltreatment co-occurrence 60-75%
- Unique position to engage with perpetrators/fathers
 - Onus often placed on mother
 - Separation without support can increase risk







- CPS has a key role to play in potentially saving lives

 - More effectively engage fathers & hold them accountable
 - More thoughtfully engage mothers
 - Enhanced community collaboration
